The Children's Home Society of West Virginia's Parkersburg office this month celebrated 128 years of promoting the well-being of the Mountain State's youngest residents.

Technically, Founder's Day for the organization falls in May, but Denise Hughes, director of programming, said they slated the second annual event on West Virginia Day be-

cause more people would be able to participate.

Renovations are ongoing at the former Worthington Elementary School where the organization plans to move, but representatives of the Society and other organizations that provide services to children and families set up outside the buildings.



"We've had students stop by; we've had ex-teachers stop by," Hughes said. "We do want everybody to know that we're going to make good use of this space and ... be good neighbors."

Services to be provided at the site include visitation for children in foster care with their birth families, pantries to provide needed supplies to families, shower and laundry facilities for teens who have aged out of foster care and recreational space for kids at the Arthur N. Gustke Child Shelter. Nobody will be staying overnight at the former school.



The Health Plan and UniCare were on hand Thursday to provide information about their services, along with the Circles Campaign of the Mid-Ohio Valley, Westbrook Health Services and Community Resources Inc. The Parkersburg Art Center offered craft activities, the Parkersburg Fire Department gave kids an up-close look at one of their trucks, and food and ice cream was available, along with games and a cupcake walk.

Parkersburg resident Erin Fulmer brought her daughter Hannah to the event

"She loves the face-paint and the games," Fulmer said, adding that it's important to her to support the Children's Home Society because "they do good work for the community."

Heather Morgan, of Davisville, said she was grateful to have the opportunity to learn about organizations she might be able to work with in her job, as well as have an activity for her kids.



Morgan and her family took home some free fruits and vegetables from Community Resources. Bri Burchard, community service specialist, said she hoped to tell visitors about the organization's Hope Grows Garden, which provides its food pantry with fresh produce.
