The Children's Home Society of West Virginia Emergency Shelter Care Program provides statewide care to children throughout West Virginia. For every child that has walked through our doors at any of our 8 emergency children's shelters, our goal is to not only provide shelter, but a sense of belonging and hope. We want our children to feel and know that we are there for them. Much too often, the children that come to our shelters carry stories in their heart that are too heavy for them to bare alone. # EVERY CHILD DESERVES A LOVING HOME...



The Permanency Program operates under the following mission, “We believe every child deserves a lifetime family, that permanency is possible for all children, and that the single most important thing we can do to promote positive long-term outcomes for children is to connect them with stable and loving families.” The work that we do shows our commitment to our mission. The Permanency Program cared for **432** of West Virginia’s most vulnerable youth this past fiscal year.

Our permanency staff worked diligently to ensure that each youth had the loving home that they so very much deserve. In working towards helping our youth achieve permanency the Society finalized **74** adoptions, supported families so that **52** reunifications were possible, and **26** youth were able to be placed with a kinship or relative placement.

Our permanency staff worked industriously to recruit, train and approve new families, opening **61** loving homes this past year to care for our children. When asked to provide positive stories about their experiences in providing foster care and adoption, families provided the following responses:

- We have seen lots of families reunified.
- We adopted from foster care and now are parents to a spunky 7-year-old who is our world.
- Watching a child grow and develop in our home. Seeing them learn to read, become potty trained, and be full of life.
- I enjoyed making Christmas a magical time for her.

Youth belong with their families and when that is not possible who better than a CHS foster home. Our families and staff play an integral role in the youth’s story whether our youth are with us for a short period of time or their permanency plan becomes adoption. Our families pour love, stability, and care on each child placed in their home adding brush strokes to their masterpiece.

# A DOOR THAT IS ALWAYS OPEN...

Family Support Centers (FSC) are designed to increase strength and stability among the families served. Centers provide a soft place to land within the community where struggling families can find friendly, engaging, staff who seek to understand each one’s circumstances, and provide a non-judgmental response to the challenges faced.

FSC’s are grounded in the Five Protective Factors Framework which encompasses evidenced-based principals and offers opportunities for families to build Social and Emotional Competence in their children, increase Knowledge of Parenting & Child Development, build Social Connections among parents, provide Concrete Supports to meet basic needs and access to essential services, and develop Resilience to overcome life stressors.

Trust building is the cornerstone of our FSC work. It opens the door to change and growth, and establishes the path for all other objectives to be accomplished. Each month, Children’s Home Society FSC’s serve hundreds of families who are faced with seemingly insurmountable obstacles. Once they experience our FSC staff’s genuine care and compassion, nurturing responses, and can-do attitudes, they begin to envision hope for the day, and the inner strength necessary to bounce back from crisis.

These relationships most often begin with the provision of food, clothing, diapers and formula, and other basic needs such as personal-care items. There is also an overwhelming and underfunded need for children’s beds and therefore prioritized by some FSC’s through efforts to secure monetary donations, grants, and volunteers to coordinate distribution. Other critical areas of need include the population of grandparents raising grandchildren. Those we encounter through the FSC severely lack resources and supports to navigate this unexpected and unintended retirement plan imposed upon them by our state’s addiction challenges. In spite of the looming cloud of barriers, they are resilient, and are committed to providing a safe and nurturing environment for their most beloved little ones, many who are burdened with lifelong physical and emotional scars.

All aspects of the Family Support Center’s work are significant to the desired outcomes of safe, stable and resilient families. Perhaps when we insure provision of the most basic of human needs, we give families the best opportunity to become physically and emotionally available for achieving personal growth and building self-sufficiency.

During the 2024-2025 fiscal year, our Resource Centers assisted **4,013** individuals statewide. These children and their families were able to benefit from the in-kind support given to CHS by numerous businesses, individuals, churches, and civic groups throughout West Virginia.

During the 2024-2025 fiscal year, our Family Support Centers assisted **4,765** children and families. The centers are unique in their approach to working with families. They build families’ strengths and capacities, work for positive social change, and offer help without stigma. Parents may act in many capacities, such as serving on a decision-making board, participating in programs, or planning and participating in community events.

**OUR MISSION**

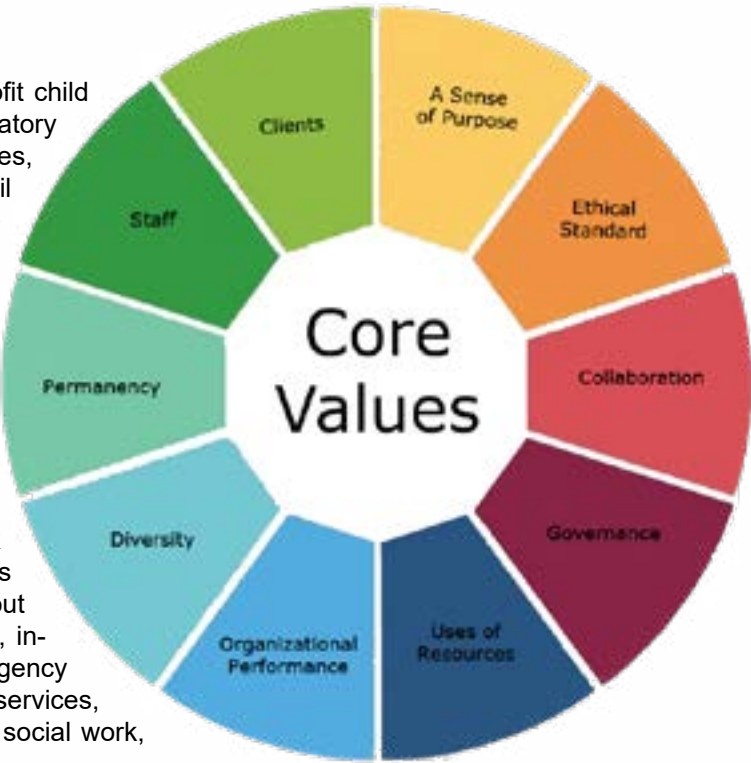
The Mission of the Children's Home Society is to promote the well-being of children. Our current efforts are directed at helping children find lifetime families, protecting and nurturing children, and helping preserve and strengthen their families.

**OUR VISION**

Each child in West Virginia grows up in a safe and nurturing family that provides for his or her current and future needs.

The Children's Home Society of West Virginia is a private, non-profit child welfare organization founded in 1896. The Society is a participatory organization consisting of employees, foster families, adoptive families, volunteers, Board members, Directors Emeriti, advisory council members, donors, benefactors, supporters, and friends. We are governed by a volunteer Board of Directors that is representative of the communities we serve from around the state. We are licensed to provide child welfare and behavioral health services in West Virginia. We are a member agency of the Emergency Shelter Providers Network, the National Council For Adoption, the Foster Family Treatment Association, and the Children's Home Society of America. We are fully accredited by the Council on Accreditation of Services for Families and Children.

Comprehensive child welfare, behavioral health, social casework and advocacy services were provided to **24,667** children and families during the 2024/2025 fiscal year from 13 primary locations throughout the state. Some of our current programs are adoption, foster care, in-home and in-community services for children and families, emergency shelter care, parent education training, prenatal and early childhood services, volunteer and mentoring, visitation and reunification, school based social work, and comprehensive assessment services.

Their kindness and compassion have made such a powerful impact and assisted our children and families in having a wonderful Christmas.

The Little Red Stocking Campaign begins the day after Thanksgiving and ends on Christmas Eve. Each stocking costs only one dollar, and the money raised stays in that local community where the stocking is sold.

Across the state, our locations have built strong partnerships with hundreds of small businesses, each one deeply rooted in the heart of their own communities. These businesses are our neighbors, friends, and quiet heroes who care so deeply about the children growing around them. There's something truly special about the way communities come together this time of year and because of this, West Virginia families feel seen, valued, and loved.
