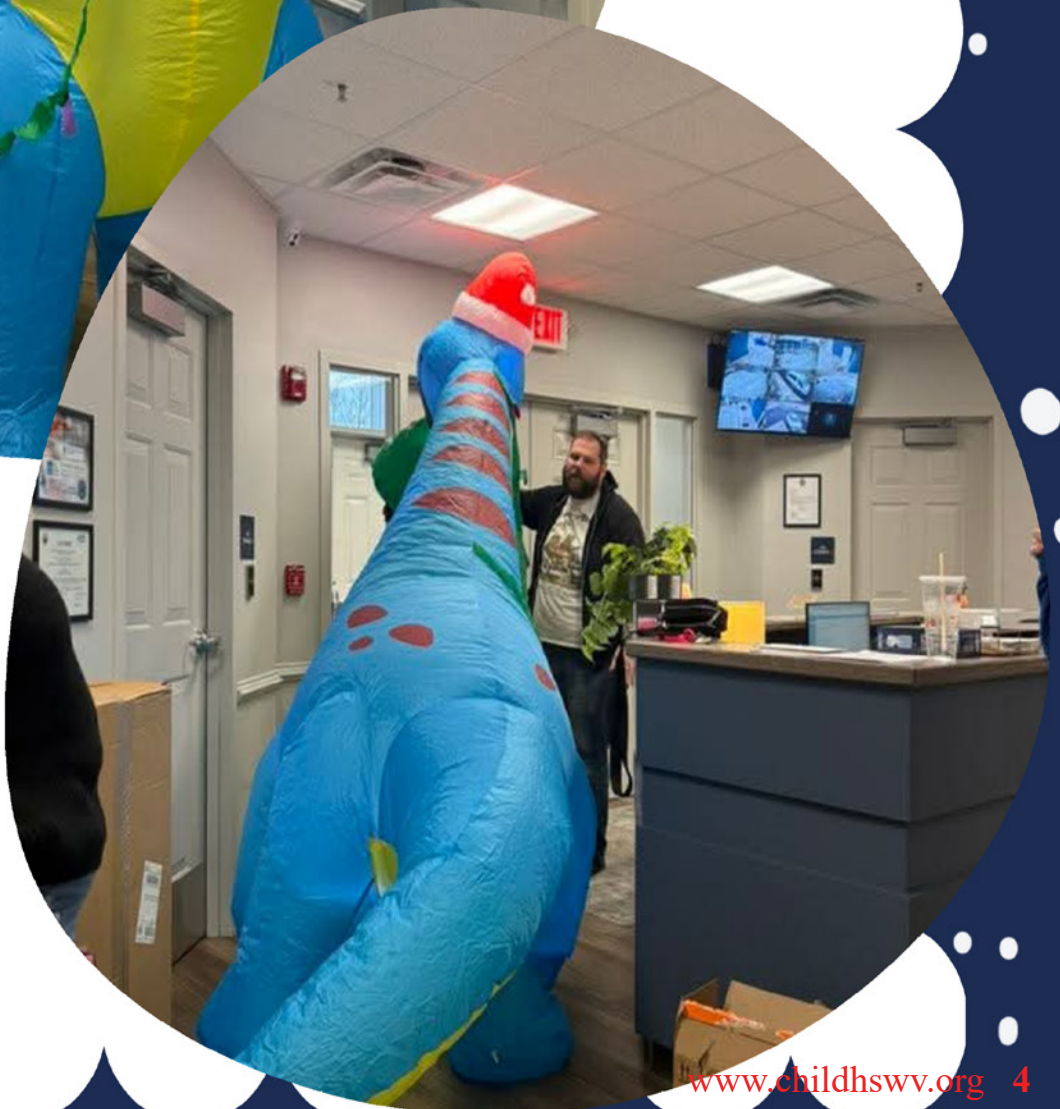




Our Very First Christmas at The Matthew Pack Children's Home

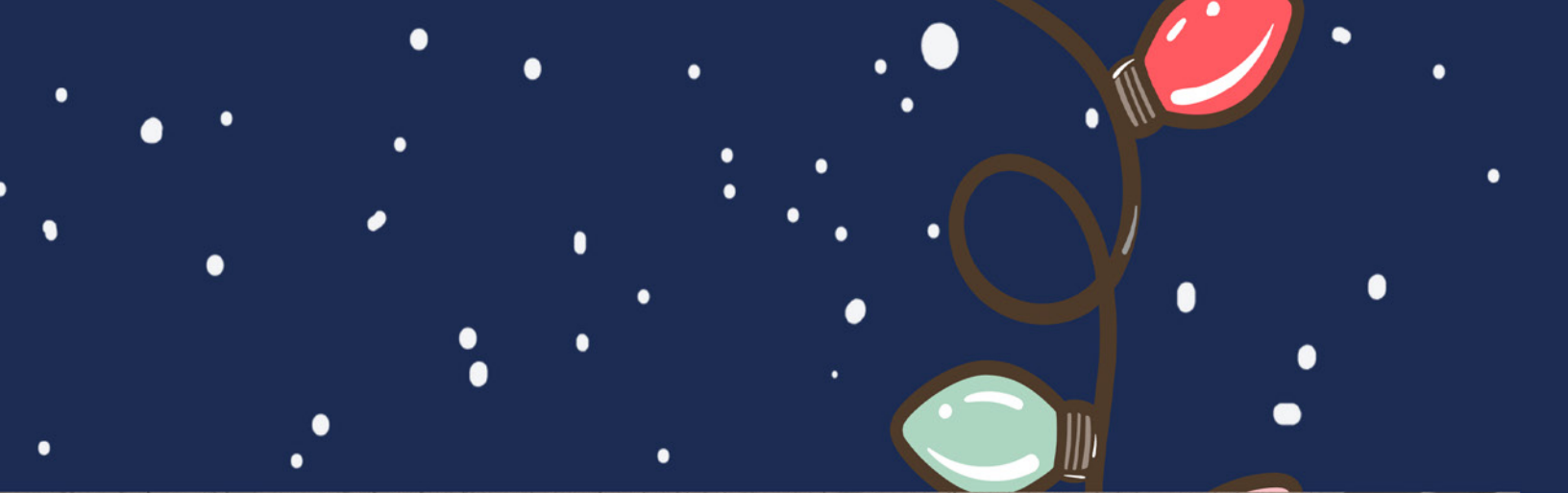

The Cabell County Family Support Center (FSC) and Nancy Tonkin Children's Resource Center served over 200 families during the Christmas season. The conference room and children's visitation room were temporarily transformed in to Santa's workshop, one room with "shopping" available for parents of children birth-11 yrs. old and the other room specifically set up for tweens and teens. This is our fifth year hosting families at Jan's House and It is nothing less than miraculous to see the community support for this event. In addition to toys and gifts, we're also able to provide each family with coats, clothing, books. Every family also leaves with a Holiday food box full of all the necessary items to prepare a Christmas meal. Parents were overwhelmed with gratitude, all of them finding just the right to wrap and place under the tree.

The FSC also partnered with the YMCA, The Health Plan, and the Cabell FRN to host Cookies & Cocoa with Santa. One of our Recovery Point volunteers who completed the program and is now employed by RP, dressed up as Santa and another volunteer dressed as Elf on a Shelf. The children and families each had an opportunity to talk to Santa, eat pizza, enjoy cocoa, take polaroid pictures, and spend time with loved ones creating Christmas crafts. Each caregiver we engaged expressed their gratitude for the opportunity to attend the free event open to all. It provided the chance for us to engage some of our current participants in the FSC and also meet new families whom had never heard of CHS or the work we do in our community.

At the Lewisburg Community Based office, Christmas did not begin in December. It began in August.

While summer was still in full swing, our team was already preparing—planning, applying, and laying the groundwork for the season ahead. Long before decorations were hung, the work was happening quietly behind the scenes, fueled by the belief that every child deserves to feel seen and celebrated at Christmas.

By Halloween, that work began to take shape. Our staff decorated their trunks for Trunk or Treat, as is customary, with a Christmas theme. Along with candy for the kids, parents were given Christmas wish lists, created directly from the most requested gifts shared by children themselves. These lists allowed community members who were able, to begin shopping early for kids in need, turning simple paper lists into tangible hope.

In November, our Christmas efforts expanded even further. For the second year in a row, the State Fair of West Virginia graciously provided us space to set up our annual workshop. This year, however, Christmas at the Lewisburg Site had grown so much that we needed a larger space. The Blue Ribbon Building became home to our workshop, and we are endlessly grateful to the State Fair for allowing us to grow and continue this work. Their partnership made it possible to meet the increasing needs of our community. It truly takes a village.



What began as an empty building quickly transformed into something extraordinary. The workshop became a hub of generosity, activity, and care. This year, it served 314 children—each one representing a family, a story, and a moment that mattered. The space was filled with excitement and joy, made even more special by a visit from Old Saint Nick himself, creating memories that will last far beyond the holiday season.

Following the setup of our workshop, several toy drives were held throughout the community, each one met with overwhelming generosity. The first large drive was held by the West Virginia Daily News. This is the second year they have done a large toy drive for our location, collecting over 100 toys each year. Additional donation locations included Flanagan's Barbershop, Dollar General North, Warner Music School, Greenbrier County Public Library, Lewisburg Tan, Beards & Bangs, Dollar General Frankford, Tri-County Produce, Alderson Big Wheel, GVCH, and Western Auto. We also received a large donation from Toys for Tots. Because of this collective effort, we were able to create a "shop" inside our workshop stocked with donated toys.

Through partnerships with Day Report, Family Treatment Court, DoHS, and other agencies, parents and caregivers were invited to come in and shop for their own children. This approach focused on empowerment—allowing parents to experience the pride and dignity of giving to their children themselves. Watching families carefully choose gifts and imagine Christmas morning for their kids was truly magical and deeply moving.

As special as the workshop was, the real Christmas magic lived in the community. Year after year, community members step forward to make Christmas possible for children, and this year was no exception. Individuals, civic groups, businesses, and organizations came together with generosity that was both humbling and inspiring. Their support was steady, intentional, and deeply heartfelt. Watching our community rally around its children reminded us that this work is never done alone.

One shining example of this was the continued support we received from Greenbrier East High School. The Student Government Association once again coordinated a Christmas operation at their school, rallying students, clubs, and organizations around the shared goal of helping others. This year, they sponsored 68 children. Seeing young people come together to help other kids is especially meaningful to us, and their efforts serve as a powerful reminder of the impact of kids helping kids.



We had the joy of celebrating with our foster families again this year through our annual Foster Care Christmas Party. The theme was “Taco About Christmas”. The event was filled with laughter, cookie decorating, crafts, music and fellowship, but it also held moments that could not be planned. This year, siblings met for the first time, while others reconnected after time apart. Santa and the Grinch made appearances, making the children smile and laugh, and bringing gifts for all of them, but it was the connections formed across the room that made the night unforgettable. It was, quite simply, pure magic.

One of the most meaningful parts of this season focused on our Independent Living Program young adults—often the most overlooked during the holidays because they are considered “adults” by all accounts.

This year, the Greenbrier Sporting Club went above and beyond to ensure these young people were not forgotten. Their generosity was thoughtful and intentional, providing essential and empowering items such as individual safes for important documents, tool sets, and much more. Nearly every day, their contact reached out asking what else could be done and how they could continue supporting these young adults. The impact of this support has already been felt, as youth confidently use their tools and take pride in their growing independence.



We were also deeply touched by the compassion shown by Aubrina Mumford, a local United Way board member. Just before Christmas, Aubrina spent time at our office listening intently as we shared about our IL youth and how proud we are of them. She left that meeting with a mission on her heart. Soon after, she returned with individually wrapped gifts for each of our IL young adults. Her thoughtfulness is a powerful example of how this program reaches beyond our office and into the heart of the community.

In that same spirit, Reverend Sara Heino Bissell made it her mission to sponsor our young adults as well. Along with an incredible group of community members, she ensured that each young person was shopped for individually and received everything on their respective wish lists. The care, intention, and love behind this effort were unmistakable.



Our agency-wide Little Red Stocking Campaign once again received incredible community support. With several local stores participating, and a multitude of donors, the campaign raised close to \$67,000. That number speaks volumes. It reflects a community that deeply loves its children and young adults and is willing to show up for them in meaningful ways.

We were out again in Hinton again this year at the Hometown Christmas Festival, selling delicious soup and collecting love in the form of Little Red Stocking donations. Our Advisory Council members, Miss Betty Hendrick and Christine Capparotta, spent the day with us talking to the community about our campaign. Raising over \$1,000 in one day, these two women, along with our dedicated staff, kindly and compassionately spread our mission of love and hope through downtown Hinton, warmed people up with cups of soup and helped us gain a multitude of supporters and friends.

The holiday season is a particularly meaningful time for the children in our care, and this year was no exception. Our favorite tradition at GVCH is kicking off the Holiday season with the 12 days of Christmas. Holiday activities included baking cookies, making ornaments, writing Christmas cards, watching Christmas movies, and driving through the community to look at lights. Thanks to our midnight staff, the shelter halls, the Rec Room, and the TV Room were transformed into a traditional theme of Snowmen, Reindeers, and Elves, with most of the decorations being handmade by all staff. A homemade fireplace was crafted in the middle of the TV area, adding a cozy and imaginative touch that became a favorite gathering place for residents.



Giving back is the forefront of what we do. During the Holiday season, our residents participated in an outreach project that focused on giving back to those who needed a little extra cheer. This started with making Christmas boxes for some neighbors at the shelter who were shut-ins. With the help of the staff, these were delivered on Christmas Eve. Our residents also partnered with a local nursing home, adopting 13 residents who did not have family. Our residents put together gift bags filled with new socks, a book, a puzzle book, hygiene items, and snacks that could be handed out on Christmas morning. GVCH staff, and help from the community, sponsored 2 young boys for Christmas. The family lost their home and everything inside a couple of weeks before Christmas. GVCH was able to open up our community closet and allow the family to get clothing and shoes for everyone.

The level of support we received from the community near and far truly exceeded our expectations, and made a tremendous impact on our residents and shelter. We had gifts mailed from Georgia, South Carolina, and Connecticut. We had multiple individuals who took on the role of shopping for each one of our residents. Arby's in Sam Black played a tremendous role in ensuring every child was shopped for. We had 17 residents who were sponsored, with most getting to take their gifts on to the next placement. We had gift cards donated, allowing the residents to draw names and play Secret Santa. Velma Viars, Becky, and Lowell Bennett donated gift cards for each of our residents to be able to shop after Christmas. If there was a need, it was donated. From Christmas stockings filled with goodies to Christmas Eve PJs, someone in the community donated them.

Santa Steve was able to donate to GVCH using the money earned as Santa Steve in the community. Other volunteers included several churches bringing Christmas parties to the shelter. 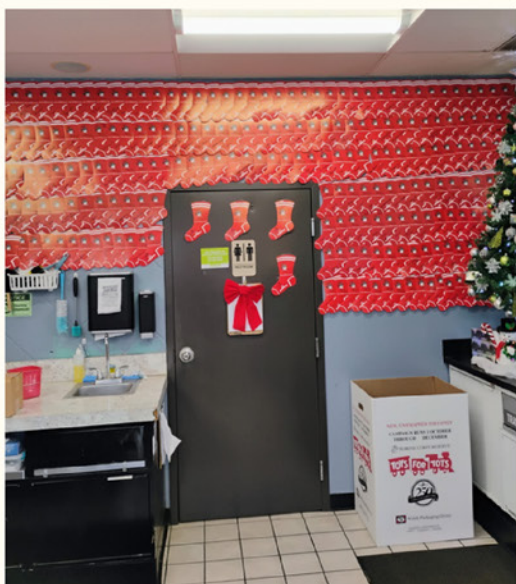

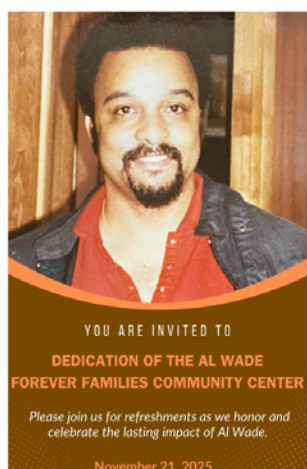

During the holiday season, the **Parents as Teachers** (PAT) Program supported 20 families through the distribution of Christmas gift bags. A total of 36 children received brand-new pajamas, including 29 children enrolled in the PAT program and 7 siblings. Each family also received three new books to encourage reading at home, as well as a gas-only gift card to help offset holiday travel and related expenses. In addition, the program hosted a Christmas Group Connection event that brought families together to celebrate and build connections. Nine families attended the event, representing 17 children and 12 adults.



Right from the Start provided support to 65 families. The DCCs and dropped off gift bags that were put together for each family that contained maternal socks, chap stick, infant baby wash, baby shampoo and baby lotion.

The Permanency Program hosted its annual Foster and Adoptive Christmas Party, made possible through the generosity of New Hope Baptist Church, Scotts Landscaping, the MacIver Family, Books-A-Million, and the PMC Spirit of Giving Grant. With their support, staff were able to shop for 44 children and host the party at New Hope Baptist Church.

Every child in attendance received a book, a new set of pajamas, a gift, and a \$30 movie gift card. In addition, all 18 attending families received a poinsettia and a gingerbread house kit to enjoy together at home. Families expressed deep gratitude for the gifts, and children were thrilled to meet Mr. Claus, have their pictures taken, and celebrate the holiday season with the program community.



Cardinal Family Support Center

The Cardinal Family Support Center helped 468 children across 147 households during the holiday season. Christmas food boxes were distributed to 20 families, ensuring they had a festive meal. Additionally, staff were able to shop for 4 families, including 6 teenagers, helping to make their holidays brighter and more joyful. Many donations were received from the community, including the Painters Union, Marshall Alumni, Westminster Presbyterian Church, Books-A-Million, the Secret Santa's, and TLC.

In the aftermath of a recent traumatic event in our community, our organization was able to support a family facing an unexpected and deeply difficult time. During the holiday season, we provided Christmas gifts and gift cards to the siblings of a young man who passed away unexpectedly. This assistance helped ease immediate stress on the family and allowed the children to experience moments of joy and normalcy during the holidays.

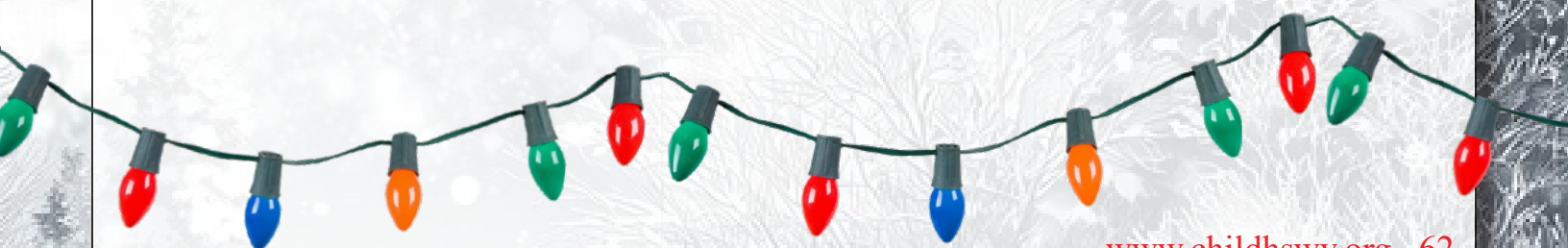

The agency supported a family led by a mother of two who has been actively working toward long-term addiction recovery while prioritizing the care of her children. Following a recent move, the family experienced financial hardship as they worked to establish housing, routines, and basic needs. Our organization provided holiday assistance that helped relieve financial strain and ensured the children were able to enjoy a meaningful Christmas. Both parents expressed deep gratitude, sharing that the support allowed them to focus on maintaining a safe, stable, and nurturing home environment. The parents expressed their worries about being able to provide for their children's Christmas and how deeply grateful they were to have an agency in their community that went above and beyond to help families in need.

During the holiday season, we assisted a woman who stepped in to provide immediate care for two children who had been living in unsafe conditions without reliable heat. With the consent of their grandmother, the woman welcomed the children into her home to ensure their safety and well-being. Wanting to provide stability and a sense of normalcy, she sought support to make the holidays special for the children. Our organization was able to assist with meeting the children's needs and ensuring they experienced a positive Christmas. Shortly after this, the woman was granted custody of the children, solidifying a safe and supportive home environment. The family has sought out more information on programming through the agency and is excited about upcoming events held by the Family Support Center.



The agency supported a family after the father experienced a serious car accident shortly before Christmas, resulting in back surgery and a period of recovery. Due to medical and household expenses, the family used funds originally set aside for the holidays to cover essential bills. Believing they would be unable to provide Christmas for their children until later in the year. The family contacted CHS for assistance after seeing our Facebook post about Christmas assistance. Our organization was able to provide holiday support, ensuring the children still experienced the joy and normalcy of Christmas while their families focused on healing and recovery. The parents were very grateful for the help received.

The Independent Living Program was supported by an individual donor who provided gift baskets for each young adult in the program. In addition, staff presented each client with a \$100 Walmart gift card and a Christmas card. Many of the clients did not expect these gifts and were very appreciative.

The Transitional Living Program partnered with the Westminster Church Women's Auxiliary to provide stockings and gifts for 24 households, serving a total of 33 individuals, including nine children. Staff were also able to provide Christmas trees and decorations for three youth. The youth expressed deep gratitude for the gifts they received. One of them sent the following message to a staff member:

"I did not open M's blanket that is going under our tree, but I opened everything else, and needless to say, I started tearing up a bit. Thank you guys so much for everything you've done for us. You've changed our lives more than any of you could realize. We would not be where we are without any of you. Have a wonderful Christmas."

This message is a touching reminder of the positive impact these efforts have on the youth and families in our program.
